

Summer of Giving Update

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

It is halfway through the summer so I thought I would take this opportunity to give you an update on our Summer of Giving program. I am blessed beyond words to report that we as a church have increased our giving this summer and are really starting to develop a culture of Stewardship here at Centenary UMC.

In 2014 during May thru the first half of July members and friends of Centenary UMC weekly giving was \$18,623.31. So far this summer, in the same time period, members and friends of Centenary UMC have increased their stewardship in the form of financial support of tithes and offerings to \$25,460.37! That is a 37% increase this summer so far! Praise be to God!

But that is not all! In addition, offerings received by CUMC specifically to help pay apportionments have significantly increased as well! During the above mentioned time period in 2014 CUMC received offerings of \$239.50 to go towards apportionments. In the same time frame so far this summer we have received \$1,534.00, a 504% increase. Can I get an Amen?

We are halfway towards possibly the best summer ever in terms of not only Stewardship but also increased attendance during worship here at Centenary UMC. Let us continue to be a blessing to Jesus Christ and His church by continuing to attend worship whenever possible and continuing to financially support making disciples of Jesus Christ here at CUMC this summer.

Continue, brothers and sisters, to faithfully give as you have prayerfully discerned you are called by God to in terms of both quantity and quality. This may very well be the first fall in quite a while where we can focus on our mission and fall programming instead of communicating about and asking for your help with a financial short fall....and I think God would be just as happy about that as you would.

Whether you work or are out of town on weekends, your family's schedule makes it hard to make it to worship on the weekends, or something came up and you missed your regular weekend worship service, we invite and encourage you to attend the Wednesday Night Praise Service at 6:30 p.m.

The Wednesday Night Praise Service will be similar to the 10:30 a.m. Praise Worship services on Sunday with

Ed Santiago leading the praise music and Pastor Jeff giving the same message from the previous weekend. There will also be the Sacrament of Holy Communion on the Wednesday following Holy Communion Weekend.

Before Wednesday Night Praise Service

Beginning Wednesday, September 16 there will be a meal and fellowship every Wednesday Night at 5:30 pm. (an hour before the new Wednesday Night Praise Service) in the downstairs Fellowship Hall. This means that you don't have to make dinner before you come to church on Wednesday night!

Suggested donation is \$1.50/person or \$5.00/family (up to 7 people).

From Our Parish Nurse.....

August is National Immunization Awareness Month!

Each year in August, National Immunization Awareness Month (NIAM) provides an opportunity to highlight the value of immunization across the lifespan. People of all ages are encouraged to protect their health by being vaccinated against infectious diseases. Most young parents in the U.S. have never seen the devastating effects

that diseases like measles or whooping cough (pertussis) can have on a family or community. It's easy to think of these as diseases of the past.

But the truth is they still exist. Many vaccine preventable diseases are only a plane ride away. For example, measles is still common in many parts of the world. The disease

is brought into the United States by unvaccinated travelers who are infected while in other countries. When measles gets into communities of unvaccinated people in the U.S. (such as people who refuse vaccines for religious, philosophical or personal reasons), outbreaks are more likely to occur.

For Children:

Vaccines give parents the safe, proven power to protect their children from serious diseases. Parents can provide the best protection by following the recommended immunization schedule giving their child the vaccines they need, when they need them.

- * Babies receive vaccinations that help protect them from 14 diseases by age 2. It is very important that babies receive all doses of each vaccine, as well as receive each vaccination on time.
- * After age 2, children are still recommended to receive a yearly flu vaccine and will be due for additional vaccine doses between 4 and 6 years of age.

Getting all of the recommended vaccines is one of the most important things parents can do to protect their children's health. If a child falls behind the recommended immunizations schedule, vaccines can still be given to "catch-up" the child before adolescence.

When children are not vaccinated, they are at increased risk for disease and can spread disease to others in their play groups, child care centers, classrooms and communities – including babies who are too young to be fully vaccinated, and people with weakened immune systems due to cancer and other health conditions.

Preteens and teens are at risk for diseases like meningitis and HPV cancers and need the protection of vaccines to keep them healthy.

Vaccines are recommended for preteens and teens because:

- *Some of the childhood vaccines wear off over time, so adolescents need shots to stay protected from serious diseases like tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough).
- *As children get older, they are at greater risk of getting certain diseases like meningitis, septicemia (blood infection), and infections that can lead to HPV cancers.
- *Specific vaccines, like HPV vaccine, should be given during the preteen (11 to 12) years because they provide more protection when given at that age.
- *HPV is short for human papilloma virus. There are more than 40 HPV types that infect human mucosal surfaces, mostly the genitals and mouth/throat. Although most infections will go away naturally, some infections that don't go away can cause cancers in men and women.

* Preteens need the HPV vaccine now to prevent HPV cancers later in life. About 79 million people in the U.S., most in their teens and early 20s, are infected with HPV. About 14 million people become infected every year.

*CDC, the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American Academy of Family Physicians strongly recommend HPV vaccination at ages 11 to 12 for the best protection against HPV cancers.

*For teens who have not started the series at 11 or 12 years, it's not too late. It is still beneficial to get the vaccine as soon as possible during the teen years

Adults:

Every year, thousands of adults in the U.S. needlessly suffer, are hospitalized, and even die from diseases that could be prevented by vaccines.

All adults should get vaccines to protect their health. Even healthy adults can become seriously ill, and can pass certain illnesses on to others.

Immunization is especially important for older adults and for adults with chronic conditions such as asthma, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), diabetes or heart disease. Immunization is also important for anyone who is in close contact with the very young, the very old, people with weakened immune systems, and those who cannot be vaccinated. All adults should get the influenza (flu) vaccine each year to protect against seasonal flu.

Every adult should also get the Td or Tdap vaccine once if they did not receive it as an adolescent to protect against pertussis (whooping cough), and then a Td (tetanus, diphtheria) booster shot every 10 years.

In addition, women are also recommended to get the Tdap vaccine each time they are pregnant, preferably at 27 through 36 weeks.

Adults may need other vaccines – such as shingles, pneumococcal, hepatitis, HPV – depending on one's age, occupation, travel, health status, vaccination history, and other risk factors.

Vaccines are thoroughly tested before licensing and carefully monitored after they are licensed to ensure that they are very safe. Vaccines are among the safest and most cost-effective ways to prevent disease. They not only protect vaccinated individuals but also help protect entire communities by preventing and reducing the spread of infectious diseases.

Currently the United States has the safest, most effective vaccine supply in its history. The country's long-standing vaccine safety system ensures that vaccines are as safe as possible.
