Accountable Leadership Board Approved!

At the annual Charge Conference held on November 2, our circuit approved our change to the Accountable Leadership Board of administration.

What this means is that after a transition period of 3-6 months, there will no longer be committees in charge of decision-making in the church. Instead, decision will be made by a board consisting of 9-12 people who will meet monthly. In addition to the board members, there will be teams created to do the legwork required to make recommendations to the board (essentially what committees used to do).





From Our Parish Nurse.....

'Tis the Season...

Fall and winter is a time where many communities experience an increase in illnesses. Colds, the flu, and the stomach bug start to increase as persons spend more time inside in close proximity to others. Often you hear people claim they have "just a little cough," or a mild "stomach bug," but how do you really know the difference between all of these illnesses? The following chart hopefully can explain the similarities and differences in symptoms to a few common illnesses and in the process help you stay a little healthier this season by avoiding persons who are ill as well as staying home when you are sick to keep from spreading illness to others. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) encourages everyone to protect himself or herself and prevent the spread of influenza and other illnesses this season.

Colds and the flu (influenza) are both caused by viruses, and both are spread through respiratory secretions through close contact with others who are ill. They both can also be spread by touching something that an ill person recently touched, like a doorknob or bathroom faucet. A cold may have a slower onset, over the period of a couple of days, whereas the flu may have a sudden onset and symptoms may seem to appear out of the blue. Colds usually last between one week and ten days, whereas the flu is usually shorter in duration between three to seven days depending on severity. Colds may have symptoms like sneezing, congestion, and sore throat. Some of the symptoms of a cold overlap with the symptoms of flu,

such as coughing, headache, and chest discomfort; however, the symptoms of the flu are usually more severe compared to that of a cold. The flu can lead to pneumonia and respiratory failure, and become life-threatening.

The stomach flu is often confused with the flu or influenza. However, like colds and flu, they are different even though many of the symptoms seem to overlap. The stomach flu is caused by norovirus or another virus or bacteria affecting the gastrointestinal system. These symptoms of stomach flu can be short-lived, or can last for a little over a week. One of the complications of the stomach flu is the increased risk for dehydration from the loss of

fluids with nausea as well as frequent vomiting and/or diarrhea. It is important to rest and drink plenty of fluids if you experience symptoms similar to the stomach flu and to seek medical attention if symptoms become severe. There is not vaccine to prevent against "stomach flu," although frequent handwashing and proper storing of foods can help prevent against it.



There is, however, a vaccine to help prevent against the flu (influenza). The season flu vaccine helps to protect persons from becoming ill. According to the CDC, a yearly flu vaccine is recommended as the first and most important step in protecting against flu and it's potentially serious complications. While there are many different flu viruses, flu vaccines protect against the viruses that research suggests will be most common. Flu vaccination has been shown to reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, and missed work and school due to flu.

There are also two antiviral medications available to help treat flu, but they must be taken promptly after the onset of flu symptoms (recommended within two days of becoming ill); this makes rapid detection and diagnosis important. If you have signs or symptoms of season influenza, call your medical provider for treatment information. If you haven't already, it's not too late to call your doctor to schedule an appointment to get your flu shot. Moreover, remember to wash your hands often and avoid touching your face when out in public.

- 5. Committee Reports


Nurture: (Now includes the following committees: TLC, Christian Education, Youth Group, Retired & Re-fired Group, Fellowship Group)

SPRC-


- Went over raises
