

Greetings,

In the United Methodist Church, official policy decisions are made by the General Conference. The General Conference normally meets once every four years, and it is the body which makes it official policy for the United Methodist Church. No individual congregation or annual conference can make policy. It must come from General Conference. In February of 2019 there will be a spe-

cial General Conference to discuss the issue of human sexuality, specifically homosexuality. This will be the only topic discussed.

The issue of homosexuality is one that many Christian denominations have had to address in recent years. In the United Methodist Church there has been study and debate since the 1970 General Conference. In some form or another, homosexuality has been debated in the United Methodist Church for the last 48 years.

There are many dedicated Christians who are of every different viewpoint on the issue. From one side of the issue to the other there are people who seek to do the will of God and yet cannot come to agreement on the issue.

The issue came to a head at the General Conference of 2016 when the delegates asked the Council of Bishops to lead us through the issue (the bishops preside over sessions of the General Conference but do not typically put forth legislation). The Council of Bishops created the Commission for the Way Forward and called a special General Conference session to address the recommendations of the Commission. In February 2019 the special General Conference will meet to discuss three options for the UMC going forward.

#### Those options are:

The One Church Plan would have the denomination recognize that marriage is between two people, not explicitly between one man and one woman. It would allow pastors to decide whether or not to preside at same sex weddings, and it would give local churches the right to decide whether or not same sex weddings could take place in their sanctuaries. Finally, it would allow annual conferences to decide whether or not to ordain self-avowed, practicing homosexuals. Essentially, the plan would allow local churches, UM pastors, and local annual conferences to make their own decisions about sexual ethics, teachings on marriage, and the ordination standards for clergy. Hence, it is often referred to as the "local option."

The Traditionalist Plan would reaffirm the UM Church's present teachings\* on these matters and call for enhanced accountability standards.

The Connectional Conference Plan would create three branches of the church: one for centrists, one for progressives, and one for traditionalists. While the three branches would share responsibility and receive support from a number of general church boards and agencies, and operate under a unified Council of Bishops, each branch would have a significant degree of autonomy when it came its sexual ethics, teachings on marriage, and its ordination standards.

There will be an opportunity to learn more about these three options at Centenary UMC on Sunday, January 27 (time to be determined). Please be in prayer for our denomination as it enters into this season of discernment.

#### Until Next Time, Pastor Stanton

\*Current teachings are that homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teachings therefore no "self-avowed, practicing homosexual" may be clergy. UMC clergy also are prohibited from performing marriage ceremonies for homosexual couples.



#### From Our Parish Nurse.....

#### Cervical Cancer Awareness

Cancer starts when cells in the body begin to grow out of control. Cells in nearly any part of the body can become cancer, and can spread to other areas of the body. Cervical cancer starts in the cells lining the cervix -- the lower part of the uterus (womb). This is sometimes called the *uterine cervix*. The fetus grows in the body of the uterus (the upper part). The cervix connects the body of the uterus to the vagina (birth canal).

The American Cancer Society recommends that women follow these guidelines to help find cervical cancer early. Following these guidelines can also find pre-cancers, which can be treated to keep cervical cancer from forming.

All women should begin cervical cancer testing (screening) at age 21. Women aged 21 to 29, should have a Pap test every 3 years. HPV testing should not be used for screening in this age group.

Beginning at age 30, the preferred way to screen is with a Pap test combined with an HPV test every 5 years. This is called co-testing and should continue until age 65. Another reasonable option for women 30 to 65 is to get tested every 3 years with just the Pap test.

Women who are at high risk of cervical cancer because of a suppressed immune system (for example from HIV infection, organ transplant, or long-term steroid use) or because they were exposed to Diethylstilbestrol (DES) in utero may need to be screened more often. They should follow the recommendations of their health care team.

Women over 65 years of age who have had regular screening in the previous 10 years should stop cervical cancer screening as long as they haven't had any serious pre-cancers found in the last 20 years.

Women who have had a total hysterectomy (removal of the uterus and cervix) should stop screening (such as Pap tests and HPV tests), unless the hysterectomy was done as a treatment for cervical pre-cancer (or cancer). Women who have had a hysterectomy without removal of the cervix (called a *supra-cervical hysterectomy*) should continue cervical cancer screening according to the guidelines above.

Women who have been vaccinated against HPV should still follow these guidelines. Some women believe that they can stop cervical cancer screening once they have stopped having children. This is not true. They should continue to follow American Cancer Society guidelines.

#### Importance of being screened for cervical cancer

Screening tests offer the best chance to have cervical cancer found early when successful treatment is likely. Screening can also actually prevent most cervical cancers by finding abnormal cervical cell changes (pre-cancers) so that they can be treated before they have a chance to turn into a cervical cancer.


