

Annual Conference Report

Every year representatives from the 600+ churches and the Conference staff and various other church related entities get together to learn new things, discuss issues and make decisions for United Methodists in Wisconsin and worldwide. This year Lois and I were privileged to represent you at this meeting along with Pastor Jeff and Pastor Stanton. We spent 3 days listening to speakers and voting on various proposals which culminated in the Service of Licensing, Commissioning, and Ordination in which Pastor Jeff was Ordained as an Elder.

The agenda this year contained some potential for controversy in a resolution proposed by the Board of Church and Society proposing support of non-compliance for some of the rules in our current Discipline regarding the LGBT community and same sex marriage. The Bishop ruled the proposal "out of order" citing work currently in progress by the Council of Bishops regarding these issues. Other business included reports from the various Boards and Commissions working in our state as well as ministries through out the world. Our church reaches a great number of people spreading the love of Christ and making new disciples in Wisconsin and the world. The Conference passed a budget with a modest increase of a little over 1%. This budget is funded by the Apportionments paid by local churches and includes six different areas of spending in support of our local churches, global and national connectional ministries, and other programs necessary to support our denomination. In his State of the Church Address, Bishop Hee-Soo Jung, said that the Church is in a turbulent and chaotic time. But he said, "Now is a critical time for us to answer loud and clear, "Yes, Lord, we have faith!" He explained, "This year marks the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. It is a powerful reminder that the Church has weathered turbulent times in the past, and will continue to do so in the future." At this time, he said, "it is imperative that we raise our voice together – one with Christ – to proclaim our faith. As so many in the world seek to divide, we open our hearts, minds, and doors to bring all brothers and sisters into the family of God."

Bishop said, "Certainly, we still experience the storms. There is a storm in our Church over sexual orientation and gender identity." But we have faith that our Commission on a Way Forward, formed at the last General Conference to guide us through the storm, will serve us well, he said. According to the Bishop, there are other storms in our Conference. "But I believe Christ is helping me be the shepherd for our leaders; to help them navigate the waters when they get stirred up," he said.

We have proven our faithfulness in what we accomplished in our Fund for Discipleship, the expansion of our camp facilities, and our Imagine No Malaria campaign, Bishop said, "and I have no doubt we will rise to the occasion to fund vital mission and ministry in the future."

Another exciting part of Annual Conference is the learning opportunities that are provided. This year Adam Hamilton provided three separate sessions on "Leading Beyond the Wall". He is pastor of Resurrection United Methodist Church in Kansas City and author of numerous books and Bible studies. His information regarding leadership, worship

and evangelism was both interesting and motivating. He posed a number of questions that helped participants expand and clarify their thoughts on current and future church issues.

The Ordination service is always my favorite part of the Annual Conference. The Bishop conducts a beautiful service with the help of other Bishops from different jurisdictions and Pastors from our conference. This year there 13 people completed as Elders. Two other pastors from South Korea were recognized by the Bishop as Elders for work in their home churches.

At the service of Licensing, Commissioning, and Ordination, Bishop Jung encouraged those participating to remember several main things: first, that the mystery of "One with Christ" expresses the ultimate desire for our life and ministry; second, to remember your role as a servant leader; and third, to work together for unity.

This service is a very moving experience in which candidates commit their lives obedience to Christ's mission in the world; to lead the people of God in worship and prayer, lead persons to faith, to seek justice, peace and freedom for all people, and to take a responsible place in the government of the Church. It is especially moving when someone we know and love is one of the Ordinates.

Lois and I thank you for allowing us to represent you at this conference for the last several years. Although as with any long conference, parts of it can be boring and more difficult to sit through we always come back re-energized and re-equipped to do God's work.

From Our Parish Nurse.....

Sun Safety Facts

Everyone enjoys a summer in the sun, but some people don't realize the potential dangers. The following are some great facts and suggestions from the American Academy of Dermatology and the American Medical Association about protecting yourself and your family against the potentially damaging rays of the sun.



- 1. After applying sunscreen, you should give it 20 to 30 minutes to dry before going outside. It takes this long after application for the chemicals to start working. Letting the sunscreen dry also helps ensure that it stays on your skin.
- 2. If you've been in the sun or water, you should reapply waterproof sunscreen every two hours. Dermatologists recommend using a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 30, which blocks 97 percent of the sun's rays. SPFs higher than 30 block slightly more of the sun's rays, but the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) cautions that no sunscreen can block 100 percent of the sun's rays. It is important to note that even if you are wearing a high-SPF sunscreen, it should be reapplied approximately every two hours when outdoors and after swimming or sweating.
- 3. Surfaces such as sand or water reflect up to 85 percent of the sun's damaging rays. It's especially important to protect your skin and eyes around these surfaces.
- 4. Tightly woven clothing in dark colors provides the best protection from the sun.
- **5. The sun is strongest -- and most dangerous -- between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.** The American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) advises staying out of the sun during these hours.
- 6. A sunscreen's Sun Protection Factor (SPF) number refers to the factor by which it enhances a person's natural sun protection. If someone normally burns in 20 minutes, then a sunscreen with an SPF of 15 would protect them for 300 minutes (SPF $15 \times 20 \text{ minutes} = 300 \text{ minutes}$).
- **7. The minimum SPF number recommended by the AAD is 30.** The AAD recommends applying a broad-spectrum sunscreen with this minimum SPF daily.
- 8. The American Medical Association (AMA) recommends that you begin applying sunscreen to your baby when he's 6 months old. Ideally, babies under 6 months should not spend time directly in the sun. Since babies' skin is much more sensitive than adults, sunscreens should be avoided if possible. Instead, the AAD says the best sun protection for babies is to keep them in the shade as much as possible and dress them in long sleeves, pants, a wide-brimmed hat, and sunglasses. Sunscreen can be applied to exposed skin not covered by clothing on toddlers and infants 6 months or older.

9. Clouds and pollution often give a false sense of protection. Even on cloudy or hazy days, unseen ultraviolet sun rays can cause unexpected sunburn and skin damage.

- 10. Toy sunglasses worn in the sun may be worse for your baby's eyes than nothing at all. Toy sunglasses simply shade baby's eyes, making her pupils larger and actually allowing more damaging rays to reach the inside of the eye.
- 11. Some babies are sensitive to para aminobenzoic acid (PABA), the active ingredient in many sunscreens. The AAD notes that sunscreen containing zinc oxide or titanium dioxide are most apprepriate for the lateral property and the lateral property apprepriate for the lateral property apprentiate for the la

or titanium dioxide are most appropriate for the thinner skin of toddlers and infants 6 months or older since they do not penetrate the skin and are less likely to cause irritation.
