





Annual Conference 2018

Pastor Stanton, Mary Gensler and Art Finnigan spent a long weekend in Madison representing our church at the Wisconsin Annual Conference. This is the annual get together of representatives from all the United Methodist churches in Wisconsin where information is shared, and decisions are made regarding the business of the church. As in years past part of the time included a Bible study which was led by Thomas Kemper, General Secretary of the General Board of Global Ministries. He shared many of his experiences as a missionary as well as what the bible says about our responsibilities as missionaries spreading the word of Jesus Christ.

Bishop Jung Called for Unity and Peace in His State of the Church Referring to Romans 12:1-2, Bishop began his address by asking, "Do we really want to present ourselves as a living sacrifice, and setting aside our own desires and designs? We talk a lot about transformation, but do we really want to be radically and fundamentally changed? But that is what will happen if we seriously discern the will of God."

Bishop then read from Ephesians 4:1-6, and said, "This is a powerful witness: to be in Christ means to be united in Christ. In our baptism, as in our Holy Communion sharing, we become ONE in Christ, ONE with each other, and ONE in ministry to all the world. All of today's talk about schism and division and splitting the church ignores this one abiding and overarching truth: we are ONE. Even when we disagree, we are ONE. It is time to set aside our own opinion of what the Church should be, and together, prayerfully, discern what is the will of God for our Church. We cannot achieve this alone, but only together."

"Our Church has long been divided about the acceptance and full inclusion of gay, lesbian, transgender, bisexual, queer, and questioning individuals," Bishop said. "When we begin from the position that we are all created in the image of God, and that Christ died so that all the dividing walls of hostility have been destroyed...we are able to converse in a much more loving, compassionate, caring, gentle and just manner. We may never come to agreement, and we may never fully embrace a compromise, but by our faith in Jesus Christ, we can continue together in love despite our differences. The things that unite us...are always greater than the things that divide us," he said.

Bishop talked about the recent plans put forth by our Council of Bishops and our Commission on the Way Forward. None of the plans call for a split around schism. The plan recommended by the majority of the Council of Bishops is the One Church Plan, which would remove all the restrictive and divisive language from the Book of Discipline and allow a broad and inclusive approach to ministry in every Conference around the globe. "Our elected delegation to the Special Session of the General Conference have committed to meeting with every board, agency, caucus, council, and committee to hear from them," he said.

Bishop concluded by telling the Conference to "Launch Out! to let God use us for the transformation of the world. Bishop explained that we are preparing to launch the

Launch Out! fundraising and faith-raising campaign. He said, we will "do ministry that is central to God's will to reach new people with the gospel of Jesus Christ, to revitalize and reenergize our existing communities of faith, and to live fully as those who 'do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God.'" (Micah 6:8) According to Bishop Jung, this campaign is challenging to do in the best of times, and some feel it is even more difficult in times of uncertainty. "But this is what makes it so critical that we don't wait. What we do today and in the days to come will impact our ministry for our children, grandchildren, and future generations," he said.

The highlight of Annual Conference for me anyway is always the Service of Licensing, Commissioning and Ordination. At the service of Licensing, Commissioning, and Ordination, thirteen individuals were licensed as local pastors, including our own Dan Whitford. Four were commissioned for the work of an elder, two commissioned for the work of a deacon, three were ordained elders, and two individuals ordained in the Korean Methodist Church were recognized as Elders in Full Connection in the United Methodist Church. After the Gospel reading of Mark 8:34-38, Bishop Eduard Khegay from the Eurasia Episcopal Area gave his sermon *The Way of Christ*.

"Jesus says the way of Christ is full of rejection. It is a way of suffering and death," Khegay said. He discussed what the way of Christ means in our modern life, "Today we live in a different era. At least in my country and in your country, I don't see anybody killed or crucified because of faith. But try something like reforming your church, or try something to transform your community, and you may learn what the suffering and hostility is. I'm sure many of you have experienced that already in your ministry and your life."

He went on to talk about the hardships that they will face in following their call to be clergy in a world that is often quite difficult. "But I want to say also the way of Christ is not only suffering. It is the way of resurrection. It is the way of joy and grace," he said. Bishop Khegay concluded his sermon with, "Sisters and brothers, we are followers of Christ, going one with each other. When we do this hand in hand, God smiles on us and rejoices."

SPRC- nothing to report



From Our Parish Nurse.....

Summer Time Skin Safety

With summer in full swing, it's the perfect time to head outdoors and enjoy the sunny weather. But are you protecting yourself from potential risks? The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has named July as Ultraviolet (UV) Safety Month. The goal is to spread the word about how important it is to protect everyone's skin from the harmful effects of UV rays.

What Is UV Radiation?

Most individuals don't realize that UV light is a form of radiation. By definition, radiation is the emission of energy from any source. Radiation has many different types, but UV radiation is a

form of electromagnetic radiation. The main source of UV radiation is the sun, although it can come from man-made sources such as tanning beds and welding torches. Radiation exists across a spectrum from very high energy, such as x-rays and gamma rays, to very low energy, such as radio waves. UV rays have more energy than visible light, but not as much energy as x-rays.

The sun emits radiation in the form of UV light, which is classified into three types by wavelength: UVA, UVB, and UVC. The ozone layer is a protective layer that blocks all UVC light, but UVB and UVA light pass through it. UVA penetrates deeply into the skin. It's the type of UV radiation that causes wrinkling or leathering of the skin. UVB is the type of radiation that causes sunburns. Exposure



to both UVA and UVB are associated with the development of skin cancer, so it is important to protect the skin during exposure to sunlight.

UV radiation is at its highest when and where the sun's rays are the strongest. This means that UV levels will be highest around noon on a clear sunny day, even more so during the summer months. UV levels will also be highest near surfaces that reflect sunlight, such as snow or sand, and it's more prevalent at higher altitudes.

How Does UV Radiation Affect Skin Cancer?

In addition to natural sun light a common source of UV radiation today is found in artificial UV lights like the type found in indoor tanning beds. The amount and type of UV radiation depends on the specific lamps used in the bed, how long a person stays in the bed, and how many times the person uses it. Most modern UV tanning beds emit mostly UVA rays, but there are still some that emit UVB rays. The American Academy of Dermatology reports that indoor tanning may be responsible for an estimated 400,000 cases of skin cancer in the United States annually.

According to the American Cancer Society, an estimated 5.4 million basal skin cancers are diagnosed annually, and nearly 3.3 million people are diagnosed with squamous cell skin cancers annually. Even more troublesome is that many people are diagnosed with more than one skin cancer type. Invasive melanoma represents about 1% of all skin cancer cases, but it accounts for the majority of skin cancer deaths with an estimated 87,110 new cases of invasive melanoma annually and 9,730 deaths annually. Overexposure to UV radiation can also cause eye cataracts, eye damage, skin aging, growths on the skin, and immune system suppression.

How to Protect the Skin from UV Radiation

Fortunately, there are measures to minimize the risks that comes with sun exposure.

Block UV light with protective clothing. This includes wearing a hat (preferably wide brimmed) as well as shade-protective clothing. This can partly shield the skin from the harmful effects of UV ray exposure. The American Academy of Ophthalmology notes that many forget to wear sunglasses that have a label that says protects 99% of UV radiation for eye protection.

Stay in the shade, especially when UV radiation is most intense at midday between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. The sun can still damage the skin on cloudy days or in the winter, so year-round protection is important. Use caution when near reflective surfaces, like water, snow, and sand, which can reflect the damaging rays of the sun. This can increase the chance of sunburn, even in areas that appear to be shaded.

Choose the right sunscreen and apply it correctly. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's regulations for sunscreen labeling recommend that the sunscreen have a sun protection factor (SPF) of at the very least 15, and it should protect against both UVA and UVB radiation. According to the National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention, most people apply only 25%–50% of the recommended amount of sunscreen. When out in the sun, apply at least one ounce (a palm full) of sunscreen every two hours. It should be applied more often when sweating or swimming, even if the sunscreen is waterproof.

Children 6 months and older should use a sunscreen with at least SPF 15, though higher is preferable. Higher SPF formulas filter more harmful rays than lower formulas. The sunscreen should also be labeled "broad spectrum," meaning it shields against both UVA and UVB rays. For areas prone to sunburn, like the nose, cheeks, ears and shoulders, choose sun protection that has zinc oxide or titanium dioxide as a main ingredient. These products often come in bright colors, so kids can have fun wearing them while getting stronger protection. Babies under 6 months should be kept away from direct sunlight, dressed in protective clothing and shaded using an umbrella or stroller canopy. Use sunscreen on an infant's sensitive skin only if other protection is unavailable.

Try to stay away from sources of artificial UV light. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention stress that indoor tanning significantly increases the risk of developing melanoma, basal, and squamous cell cancers. It also causes premature aging of the skin and suppresses the immune system.
