

Greetings in the name of the Lord!

We celebrated Mother's Day in May and are waiting for Father's Day.

In Hosea, the Hebrew word for "mercy" is hesed - which is often translated as lovingkindness or faithful love. When Jesus said "I de-



sire mercy and not sacrifice (Matthew 9:13)," it was actually a quote from the Book of Hosea. The singular root of hesed is the same word as "womb." The sharing of the same root between "mercy" and "womb" suggests that their meaning be intertwined. Perhaps, "mercy" is something that emerges from the womb: a nourishing, sustaining love, born out of pain and meant to give life. It is this mercy, this womblike love of Jesus that made Matthew turn away from sinful ways of living and took a new step of love and serving with Jesus.

Centenary UMC has been blessed by our female members who have manifested this "womblike" love. Especially, our thanks go to Lady's Fellowship Group. Serving on special occasions, fund raising, church cleaning, etc.... so many times, for many years and in many events our ladies showed how we can follow Jesus and his call to hesed "womblike love." We honor mothers of church not because you serve us food – we can go out for lunch at Dairy Queen anytime, but because you love us - not judging but supporting and encouraging, not setting limit but helping us embrace Christ's vision in faith. Drawing on this "womblike" love, our congregations have grown and will grow in full stature of Christ. Let us continue to invite, embrace more people and reconcile them to Jesus just as we were invited, embraced and reconciled to Jesus in our church.

Thanks again, mothers of church for being a model for this. We honor your love.

Memorial Sunday



Al Generosity

Al (Artificial Intelligence) has been all over the news lately as technology companies begin to break new ground with things like ChatGPT. The conversation usually centers around whether Al technology will be helpful (increasing productivity), harmful (taking people's jobs), or cataclysmic (leading to machines taking over the world).

Out of curiosity, I asked one of my social media apps that has AI to tell me a story about the impact of generosity. This was its response.

"Once there was a wealthy businessman who decided to donate a significant portion of his fortune to charity. He gave to several causes, including education, healthcare, and the arts. His donations enabled many people to access opportunities they would not have had otherwise.

One of the students who benefited from the businessman's donation was a young woman who had grown up in poverty. She was able to attend college and pursue her dream of becoming a doctor. After graduating, she went on to work in a rural clinic, where she helped many people who had limited access to healthcare. The young woman's work inspired others to follow in her footsteps, and soon the clinic became a hub for community development.

The businessman's generosity had a ripple effect that touched countless lives and transformed a whole community."

I (Jason, not the AI) thought that was a pretty good story. I will say, however, it is nowhere near as meaningful as stories I've heard people tell about how they were personally touched by someone's generosity or how being generous changed them. It's not just the story that's inspiring, but the personal, human element that is inspiring.

With that in mind, I'd encourage you to share stories of how your church's ministry either made a difference in your life or you have been impacted by the practice of generosity. It is through the telling and hearing real life stories that generosity spreads and lives are changed.

From Our Parish Nurse.....

JUNE IS ALZHEIMER'S & BRAIN AWARENESS MONTH

10 WAYS TO LOVE YOUR BRAIN CAN START NOW!

Growing evidence indicates that people can reduce their risk of cognitive decline by adopting key lifestyle habits. When possible, combine these habits to achieve maximum benefit for the brain and body:

- 1. BREAK A SWEAT- Engage in regular cardiovascular exercise that elevates heart rate and increases blood flow. Studies have found that physical activity reduces risk of cognitive decline.
- 2. STUMP YOURSELF- Challenge your mind. Build a piece of furniture. Play games that exercise the mind like bridge, crossword puzzles, or chess.
- 3. BUTT OUT Smoking increases risk of cognitive decline. Chemicals in cigarette smoke cause the cells that line blood vessels to become swollen and inflamed. This can narrow the blood vessels and can lead to many vascular conditions. Quitting smoking can reduce risk to levels comparable to those who have not smoked.
- 4. FOLLOW YOUR HEART- Risk factors for cardiovascular disease and stroke obesity, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and diabetes negatively impact your cognitive health.
- 5. HEADS UP!- Brain injury can raise risk of cognitive decline and dementia. Wear a seat belt and use a helmet when playing contact sports or riding a bike.
- 6. BUDDY UP- Staying socially engaged may support brain health. Find ways to be part of your local community or share activities with friends and family. Building social networks and participating in social activities are like exercises for your brain because they keep your mind agile and improve cognitive function.
- 7. FUEL UP RIGHT- Eat a balanced diet that is higher in vegetables and fruit to help reduce the risk of cognitive decline. Research shows that the best brain foods are the same ones that protect your heart and blood vessels, including the following: Green, leafy vegetables such as kale, spinach, collards, and broccoli are rich in brain-healthy nutrients like vitamin K, lute
 - in, folate, and beta carotene. Most fruits contain a lot of vitamin C, a key nutrient that provides a layer of protection to many organs in the body, especially the brain.

8. TAKE CARE OF YOUR MENTAL HEALTH- Some studies link mental health issues like depression with cognitive decline, so seek treatment if you have depression, anxiety or stress.

- 9. CATCH SOME ZZZ'S- Not getting enough sleep may result in problems with memory and thinking.
- 10.HIT THE BOOKS- Studies show that education will help reduce risk of cognitive decline and dementia. Take a class at a local college, community center or even online.

It's never too late or too early to incorporate healthy habits!
