

# Revision of the Confirmation Program

#### Introduction:

In 20+ years of ministry several concerns have been shared with me regarding confirmation programs and their results. Through conversations with colleagues, I have come to realize that the difficulties and challenges that the churches I served were not uncommon. Therefore, as I begin my time as the pastor of Centenary UMC I am proposing some significant changes in the confirmation program.

Instead of a two-year program that meets weekly during the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades, confirmation will be spread out over a longer period (three years). In place of weekly classes, students would be expected to participate in a series of two-hour classes. The classes will occur every other month (Sept., Nov., Jan., March, May). Ideally the students would begin in the eighth grade and would continue through the early high school years with final church membership occurring during the spring of their sophomore year in high school.

While this change spreads out the confirmation process, it greatly decreases the amount of in-class time spent while addressing some of the concerns that have been shared with me from our congregation and other concerns that have come to mind during my ministry.

Confirmation will run for three years. New students this year will enter under the new format. Returning students will be grandfathered into the two-year program and will be confirmed in early 2019.

What concerns does this change address, and how does it address them?

1) We don't see our kids after they get confirmed. They seem to drop out of the church once they have been confirmed.

This is an issue in many churches. For some reason, many youth and parents view confirmation as a sort of graduation ceremony. Just as they no longer must attend school again after graduation, so too, they feel that they do not have to attend worship again once they are confirmed.

By extending the amount of time before confirmation and church membership occurs, I can share with the youth my expectation that they be involved in the life of the church. The hope is that if they know they are expected to attend worship in order to faithfully complete the requirements of the confirmation/membership process, the youth will remain active in the life of the church during their formative high school years.

# 2) The maturity level of most 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders is not sufficient to understand the meaning of confirmation and church membership.

It has been my experience that most 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders do not possess the maturity to truly understand the meaning of confirmation and church membership. Taking the vows church membership at confirmation is a serious event, one that ought not be taken lightly or without full consideration of what it means. It is a decision that should affect a person's life in a significant way.

How many of us would want our 8<sup>th</sup> graders to make other commitments that seriously affect their lives? How many of us feel that our 8<sup>th</sup> graders have the maturity: To decide to get married? To own a car? To enlist in the military? To decide whether or not to go to school?

I use the above to illustrate what I believe has been a major flaw in the Christian church for many years; that we take the membership vows of the church too lightly. There are laws against most of the illustrations that I have shared above. Why do you suppose that is? I suspect that it is because we realize, as a society, that youth lack the maturity and understanding to make fundamental decisions on their own. So why is it that the church has felt that these same youth, while not mature enough to decide whether or not they will go to school, are mature enough to make decisions that have spiritual and eternal consequences?

By extending the amount of time before confirmation and church membership, the church can help the youth to understand the meaning of membership in the church. Through continued spiritual growth and attendance at worship as well as the classes, the youth can begin to realize what it means to be a disciple of Christ in today's world. Then, when deciding whether or not to become a member of the church, the youth will be able to do so with more knowledge of what it means to intentionally become a part of Christ's church.

There have been a few other concerns that have been shared with me, but the preceding two are the ones that have guided my decision to propose this change to the confirmation program.

#### Conclusion:

While change is something that is a challenge for us all, I pray that you will consider what I have shared with you in this proposed revision. I am open to suggestions and questions. I feel that this proposed program is in the best interest of the spiritual lives of the youth in our congregation. If you disagree please tell me. I have come to this suggested revision after much prayer and consideration. I know that it is not what we have traditionally done in the past nor is it even close, yet it is (I believe) a better way. I hope and pray that God will give us the wisdom to lead his youth in such a way that they will come to know the Christ as their personal Lord and Savior.

#### From Our Parish Nurse.....

#### May is National Mental Health Awareness Month

In 2013, President Obama proclaimed May as National Mental Health Awareness Month, a time set aside to bring the issue of mental health to the attention of the American public. The term mental illness still has a negative connotation for many Americans. This is partially due to lack of education and understanding of what it means to be affected by a mental health condition.

Sadly, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), only little more than half of adults in this country feel that the public understands those living with mental illness. Those experiencing symptoms of a mental disorder also feel the disconnect, with three-quarters reporting that American adults don't show concern for people affected by mental health conditions.

The truth is, mental illness is fairly common in the United States and its prevalence has been increasing over the last several decades. Part of the reason for the increase is advancements in identifying and treating the disease. There are about 20 percent of adults that live with mental illness on any given day according to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). 43 million Ameri-



cans have a mental health condition, yet 57% of those American adults have not received treatment. And 1 in 5 of all screened think about suicide nearly every day.

The most prevalent mental health conditions faced by Americans include disorders related to depression and anxiety. The following are facts you should know about issues related to mental health:

- Nearly 1-in-5 Americans over age 18 will experience a diagnosable mental health disorder in a given year, and nearly half (46.4 percent) will experience a mental health disorder in their lifetime,
- Approximately 70 percent of Americans experience physical and non-physical symptoms of stress, but only 37 percent think they are doing very well at managing stress
- There are a wide variety of anxiety disorders, including post-traumatic stress disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder, and specific phobias, etc. Collectively they are among the most common mental disorders experienced by Americans, affecting 18.1 of the U.S. adult population. 22.8 percent of these cases (4.1 percent of the entire population) are considered severe. The average age of onset for anxiety disorders is 11 years old.
- Women are 60 percent more likely than men to experience an anxiety disorder.
- Neuropsychiatric disorders are the leading cause of disability in the U.S., followed by cardiovascular and circulatory diseases and neoplasms. The neuropsychiatric disorders category includes mental and behavioral disorders, which account for 13.6 percent.

 Approximately 3.5 million people in the U.S. are diagnosed with schizophrenia, one of the leading causes of disability.

- Three out of four people with schizophrenia develop the illness between the ages of 16 and 25. Studies have indicated that with people to seek treatment, 25 percent of those having schizophrenia recover completely, 50 percent are improved over a 10year period, and 25 percent do not improve over time. Treatment and other economic costs due to schizophrenia are estimated between \$32.5 and \$65 billion annually.
- Throughout the world, more than 800,000 people die by suicide every year. That equals to approximately one person every 40 seconds. Currently, only 28 countries are known to have national suicide prevention strategies.
- When researchers asked those with mental illness about their experience in church 10 percent said they've changed churches because of how a particular church responded to their mental illness. Another 13 percent either stopped attending church or could not find a church. Over half, 53 percent, say their church has been supportive while about thirteen percent say their church was not supportive.

The most alarming statistics are the report of the state of our children:

- Over a 5-year period, rates of severe youth depression have increased.
- 50% of those screened age 11-17 often think about suicide or self-harm throughout the week.
- Over 76% of youth with severe depression 1.7 million kids did not get treatment they need.

"I wish I could say the mental health of our children is improving. Our report shows the opposite," said Paul Gionfriddo, president and CEO, Mental Health America. "Far too many young people are suffering —often in silence. They are not receiving the treatment they need to live healthy and productive lives - and too many simply don't see a way out."

On average, it takes 10 years between the onset of symptoms and when individuals receive treatment. Given that our young population is more likely to engage in risky behav-

ior, it is important that mental health services and treatments be made available and accessible. A timely response to the mental health needs of youth, can prevent them from entering adulthood in crisis.
