


TO LOVE YOU MORE ...

Personal Dignity Kit

- 1 Bath Hand Towel (no kitchen towels)
- 1 Bath Washcloth (no dishcloths)
- 1 Adult Toothbrush (no multipacks)
- 1 Bar Soap (3-4 oz.)
- 1 Shampoo (15-18 oz., secure lid with tape)
- 1 Deodorant (2-3 oz. stick, roll on, or pump) \$2 donation for toothpaste and razor

Place items in a 1-gallon resealable plastic bag.

Home Care Kit

- 2 Liquid Household Cleaners (16-40 oz., no spray bottles)
- 2 Dish Soaps (16 34 oz.)
- 2 Liquid Laundry Detergents (32-64 oz.)
- 1 scrub brush with or without handle

Place items into a 5-gallon bucket with a resealable cover.

We started the year 2023 with a vision of "Be a welcoming community for all, worshipping together at God's house" set by our church leadership board (ALB: Accountable Leadership Board). A Chicken or an Eagle?

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God — what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2)

Once upon a time, a man found the egg of an eagle. It had been abandoned for some reason by its mother, but as it was still warm, the man took it and put it in the nest of one of his backyard chickens along with the other eggs that were there being brooded upon.

After a period of time, the eaglet was hatched, and along with the other chicks from his nest began to go about the backyard doing what the other chicks did. He scratched the earth for worms and insects. He looked for the corn that the man would throw into the yard. He clucked and cackled as best as he could, and as he grew, he would, like other chickens, thrash his wings and fly a few feet in the air.

Years passed in this way, and the eagle grew very old. One day he saw a magnificent bird far above him in the cloudless sky. It glided majestically among the powerful wind currents, soaring and swooping, scarcely beating its long golden wings.

The old eagle looked at it in awe and asked, "What is that?"

"That is the eagle, the king of birds," said one of his neighbors. "He belongs to the sky and to the high places. We belong to the earth, we are chickens."

The old eagle knew this was true, and so it was he lived and died as a chicken, for that is what he believed he was.

From Our Parish Nurse.....

May is Celiac Awareness Month

May is Celiac Awareness Month. Celiac disease is a genetic autoimmune disease that damages the small intestine and can cause gluten intolerance and other symptoms. The disease is triggered by eating foods containing gluten. The disease can cause long-lasting digestive problems and keep your body from getting all the nutrients it needs. Many people who have celiac disease may not even be aware of it, so it is important to recognize the symptoms.

If you have celiac disease, eating gluten triggers an immune response in your small intestine. Over time, this reaction damages your small intestine's lining and prevents it from absorbing some nutrients (malabsorption). The intestinal damage often causes diarrhea, fatigue, weight loss, bloating and anemia, and can lead to serious complications. In children, malabsorption can affect growth and development, besides causing the symptoms seen in adults. There's no cure for celiac disease — but for most people, following a strict glutenfree diet can help manage symptoms and promote intestinal healing. This month is all about educating the public about identifying the signs, consulting your physician, and if diagnosed-- finding the best treatment possible.

The signs and symptoms of celiac disease can vary greatly and differ in children and adults. Digestive signs and symptoms for adults include:

- Diarrhea
- Fatigue
- Weight loss
- Bloating and gas
- Abdominal pain
- Nausea and vomiting
- Constipation

However, more than half the adults with celiac disease have signs and symptoms unrelated to the digestive system, including:

- Anemia, usually from iron deficiency
- Loss of bone density (osteoporosis) or softening of bone (osteomalacia)
- Itchy, blistery skin rash (dermatitis herpetiformis)
- Mouth ulcers
- Headaches and fatigue
- Nervous system injury, including numbness and tingling in the feet and hands, possible problems with balance, and cognitive impairment
- Joint pain
- Reduced functioning of the spleen (hypersplenism)


Children with celiac disease are more likely than adults to have digestive problems, including:

- Nausea and vomiting
- Chronic diarrhea
- Swollen belly

- Constipation
- Gas
- Pale, foul-smelling stools

The inability to absorb nutrients might result in:

- Failure to thrive for infants
- Damage to tooth enamel
- Weight loss
- Anemia
- Irritability
- Short stature
- Delayed puberty



Examples of some of the foods that may trigger these symptoms are:

- Beer and Malt beverages
- Breads
- Bulgur wheat
- Cakes and pies
- Candies
- Cereals
- Sauces and Gravies (many use wheat flour as a thickener)
- Pastas
- Cookies and crackers
- Any foods that contain wheat, barley, rye, or triticale (a cross between wheat and rye)

Consult your physician if you have diarrhea or digestive discomfort that lasts for more than two weeks. Notify your child's physician if your child is pale, overly irritable or failing to grow or has a potbelly and foul-smelling, bulky stools. Be sure to consult your doctor <u>before</u> trying a gluten-free diet. If you stop or even reduce the amount of gluten you eat before you're tested for celiac disease, you can change the test results. Celiac disease tends to run in families. If someone in your family has the condition, ask your physician if you should be tested.
