

Greetings,

This fall is the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of an event that most of you probably haven't even heard of (or, if you have heard, probably forgotten). It is recounted in the book called *Remember Why You Play* by David Thomas. It is a book about football; specifically, about

the Faith Christian Lions in Grapeville, Texas. You see, the Faith Christian Lions did something that is really quite remarkable. The final game of their 2008 season was against Gainesville State School Tornadoes. Gainesville State School is a school for teenage inmates and as a result every game for them is a road game.

What made the game extraordinary was that before the game the Faith Christian Lions fans decided that they were going to treat the Tornadoes like the home team.

"Before the game, Faith parents and students formed a 40-yard-long spirit line and held a banner for Tornadoes players to run through when they entered the field. Then about half of the Faith fans and cheerleaders moved over to the visitors' side of the stadium and cheered for Gainesville State players throughout the game. Among those cheering were parents of Faith players, encouraging kids they did not know to tackle their own sons." (Thomas, introduction)

When news of what the Faith Christian School had done for the players of Gainesville State got out, they (Faith Christian) found themselves the object of news reports and interviews, something which the coach and players for Faith Christian didn't understand. Turns out that the Faith Christian Lions were just doing what they felt was the right thing to do.

In our sports crazed society, I wonder how many of us would do the same thing if we were faced with the same circumstances as the Faith Christian Lions. How many of us would root against our loved ones so that we could root for incarcerated teenagers? And consider this... how sad is it that we live in a society that a team's fans extending kindness becomes a national story? It seems to me that the time has come for a change and that that change begins with each one of us.

## Stewardship News

#### Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity

One of Jesus' great teaching parables involves a sower who cast seed along the ground. The sower hoped the seeds would sprout, grow, and bear good fruit. Some seeds did just that, producing a great harvest. But others, Jesus said, fell among thorns and, though they began to grow, these good plants were quickly choked out. Jesus said the thorns were "the cares of the world and the lure of wealth" (Matthew 13:22).

In a culture where having "enough" seems to have become a never-ending pursuit, Jesus' parable remains incredibly relevant. Many of us are chasing the American dream in ways that lead to stress, anxiety, and fear—thorns that can rob us of the ability to enjoy the abundant lives of purpose that God intended for us.

All of us have struggled with these issues at one time or another. They are important issues that we cannot ignore. This is why, during October and November, we will be having a churchwide study and worship emphasis called Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity. During this time, we will explore what the Bible teaches us about financial management through corporate worship and small group study. We'll hear expert advice and stories about what others have learned by working through financial challenges. Each week we will provide you with some practical tools you can use to assess your financial situation and develop a financial plan with a biblical foundation.

At the conclusion of the emphasis, we will have the opportunity to make personal commitments of our offerings to God through our church in the coming year. We will consecrate these commitments in the worship service on two consecutive weeks. (See the schedule that below.)

I hope you will join us in the coming weeks as we look at how we can manage our financial resources and truly experience simplicity, generosity, and joy.







### From Our Parish Nurse.....

#### Inflammatory Bowel Disease Awareness

The two most common forms of a group of conditions known as inflammatory bowel diseases (IBD) are Crohn's Disease and Ulcerative Colitis. When reading about inflammatory bowel diseases, it is important to know that Crohn's disease is not the same thing as ulcerative colitis. The symptoms of these two illnesses are quite similar, but the areas affected in the gastrointestinal tract (GI tract) are different and they should also not be confused with irritable bowel Syndrome (IBS), a disorder that affects the <u>muscle contractions</u> of the colon. IBS is not characterized by <u>intestinal inflammation</u>.

Normally, the cells and proteins that make up the immune system protect you from infection. In people with IBD, however, the immune system mistakes food, bacteria, and other materials in the intestine for foreign or invading substances. When this happens, the body sends white blood cells into the lining of the intestines, where they produce chronic inflammation, ulcerations, thickening of the intestinal wall, and eventually causing patient symptoms.

Crohn's most commonly affects the end of the small bowel (the ileum) and the beginning of the colon, but it may affect any part of the gastrointestinal (GI) tract, from the mouth to the anus. Ulcerative Colitis is limited to the colon, also called the large intestine.

Crohn's disease can affect the entire thickness of the bowel wall, while ulcerative colitis only involves the innermost lining of the colon. Finally, in Crohn's disease, the inflammation of the intestine can "skip", leaving normal areas in between patches of diseased intestine. In ulcerative colitis this does not occur.

The causes of Crohn's disease are not well understood. Diet and stress may aggravate Crohn's Disease, but they do not cause the disease on their own. Recent research suggests hereditary, genetics, and/or environmental factors contribute to the development of Crohn's Disease.

Crohn's tends to run in families, so if you or a close relative have the disease, your family members have a significantly increased chance of developing Crohn's. Studies have shown that 5% to 20% of affected individuals have a first – degree relative (parents, child, or sibling) with one of the diseases. The risk is greater with Crohn's disease than ulcerative colitis. The risk is also substantially higher when both parents have IBD.

Ulcerative colitis is a chronic disease of the large intestine in which the lining of the colon becomes inflamed and develops tiny open sores, or ulcers, that produce pus and mucous. The combination of inflammation and ulceration can cause abdominal discomfort and frequent emptying of the colon. As with Crohn's, Ulcerative colitis is also the result of an abnormal response by your body's immune system.

Research sponsored by the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation has led many scientists to believe that ulcerative colitis may be the result of an interaction of a virus or bacterial infection of the colon and your body's natural immune system response. Normally, your immune system will cause temporary inflammation to combat an illness or infection, and then the inflammation will be reduced as you regain health. In people with ulcerative colitis, however, this inflammation can persist long after your immune system should have finished its job.

Ulcerative colitis may affect as many as 907,000 Americans. Men and women are equally likely to be affected, and most people are diagnosed in their mid-30s. The disease can occur at any age and older men are more likely to be diagnosed than older women.

While ulcerative colitis also tends to run in families, researchers have been unable to establish a clear pattern of inheritance. Studies show that up to 20 percent of people with ulcerative colitis will also have a close relative with the disease. The disease is more common among white people of European origin and among people of Jewish heritage.

Symptoms related to inflammation of the GI tract and associated with IBD:

Persistent Diarrhea

Rectal bleeding

Urgent need to move bowels

Abdominal cramps and pain

Sensation of incomplete evacuation

Constipation (can lead to bowel obstruction)

Fever

Loss of appetite

Weight Loss

Fatique

Night sweats

Loss of normal menstrual cycle

They hope to support churches and groups in expanding their ministry through projects and creative ministries. If you have a new ministry idea or event that you would like help funding, consider applying for a grant. (These grants are to be considered seed money rather than continuing support, and the typically phase out after three years.) There is a round of grants offered in the Fall and sometimes again in the Spring. The fall round deadline is November 1, and the spring round deadline is March 1.
