Several years ago I read a book called *Remember Why You Play* by David Thomas. It is a book about football; specifically, about the Faith Christian Lions in Grapeville, Texas. You see, the Faith Christian Lions did something that is really quite remarkable. The

final game of their 2008 season was against Gainesville State School Tornadoes. Gainesville State School is a school for teenage inmates and as a result every game for them is a road game.

What made the game extraordinary was that before the game the Faith Christian Lions fans decided that they were going to treat the Tornadoes like the home team.

"Before the game, Faith parents and students formed a 40-yard-long spirit line and held a banner for Tornadoes players to run through when they entered the field. Then about half of the Faith fans and cheerleaders moved over to the visitors' side of the stadium and cheered for Gainesville State players throughout the game. Among those cheering were parents of Faith players, encouraging kids they did not know to tackle their own sons." (Thomas, introduction)

When news of what the Faith Christian School had done for the players of Gainesville State got out, they (Faith Christian) found themselves the object of news reports and interviews, something which the coach and players for Faith Christian didn't understand. Turns out that the Faith Christian Lions were just doing what they felt was the right thing to do.

In our sports crazed society, I wonder how many of us would do the same thing if we were faced with the same circumstances as the Faith Christian Lions. How many of us would root against our loved ones so that we could root for incarcerated teenagers? And consider this... how sad is it that we live in a society that a team's fans extending kindness becomes a national story? It seems to me that the time has come for a change and that that change begins with each one of us.

Accountable Leadership Board

At our meeting on October 21 Centenary UMC's Administrative Council voted to move forward and change toward the Accountable Leadership Board model of church administration. This now has to go to Charge Conference on November 2 to be approved.

Currently, CUMC operates under a traditional Administrative Board model. The Administrative Board model consists of representatives (usually the chairperson) from many committees coming together to meet once monthly to conduct the "business" of the church. The Accountable Leadership Board structure streamlines the "business" functions of the church. A brief description of the ALB model is below. This description comes from the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

Accountable Leadership Board Structure for the Local Church

In Wisconsin, over 40 churches of all sizes are engaged in or are in the process of implementing the Accountable Leadership Structure model. This model is based on the 15-year experience of over 300 churches in the West Ohio Conference.

This structure recognizes the reality that no church has sufficient money, staff, volunteers or facilities to do the entire ministry they would like to do. Therefore, valuable resources cannot be wasted on activities, programs or ministries that do not focus on the mission, vision and strategic goals.

In this model, the Administrative Council, Staff-Parish Relations Committee, Trustees, Finance Committee and Lay Leadership Committee are combined into one 9-12 member Accountable Leadership Board (ALB). When necessary to vote, the entire ALB acts as the Council, SPRC, Finance Committee or Trustees. The ALB is assisted by ministry teams that focus on making ministry happen.

This model:

Enables an intentional, congregational renewal led by a team of committed discipleship leaders.

Promotes ministry unity, functioning at a high level of efficient, cooperative decision making. Focuses ministries on the mission, vision, discipleship system and strategic goals. Relies on the latest research and experience of effective churches.

Youth Mission Trip Holiday Greenery Sales

Centenary UMC will be partnering with SideKick Missions for the 12th annual youth mission trip to Fort Wayne, Indiana, in late June 2020. About 100 youth and adults from 12 United Methodist churches in Wisconsin will be going.

Operation Christmas Child





From Our Parish Nurse.....

Lung Cancer Awareness

Lung cancer is cancer that starts in the lungs. The most common type is non-small cell lung cancer (NSCLC). NSCLC makes up about 80 to 85 percent of all cases. Thirty percent of these cases start in the cells that form the lining of the body's cavities and surfaces. This type usually forms in the outer part of the lungs (adenocarcinomas). Another 30 percent of cases begin in cells that line the passages of the respiratory tract (squamous cell carcinoma).

A rare subset begins in the tiny air sacs in the lungs (alveoli). It's called adenocarcinoma in situ (AIS). This type isn't aggressive and may not invade surrounding tissue or need immediate treatment. Faster-growing types of NSCLC include large-cell carcinoma and large-cell neuroendocrine tumors.

Small-cell lung cancer (SCLC) represents about 15 to 20 percent of lung cancers. SCLC grows and spreads faster than NSCLC. This also makes it more likely to respond to chemotherapy. However, it's also less likely to be cured with treatment. In some cases, lung cancer tumors contain both NSCLC and SCLC cells.

Mesothelioma is another type of lung cancer. It's usually associated with asbestos exposure. Carcinoid tumors start in hormone producing (neuroendocrine) cells. Tumors in the lungs can grow quite large before you notice symptoms. Early symptoms mimic a cold or other common conditions, so most people don't seek medical attention right away. That's one reason why lung cancer isn't usually diagnosed in an early stage.

Symptoms of non-small cell lung cancer and small cell lung cancer are basically the same.

Early symptoms may include:

- lingering or worsening cough
- coughing up phlegm or blood
- hoarseness or wheezing
- shortness of breath
- weakness and fatigue, loss of appetite and weight loss
- chest pain that worsens when you breathe deeply, laugh, or cough

You might also have recurrent respiratory infections such as pneumonia or bronchitis. As cancer spreads, additional symptoms depend on where new tumors form. If the tumor is forming in the:

- lymph nodes: lumps, particularly in the neck or collarbone
- bones: bone pain, particularly in the back, ribs, or hips
- brain or spine: headache, dizziness, balance issues, or numbness in arms or legs
- liver: yellowing of skin and eyes (jaundice)
- <u>top of the lungs:</u> can affect facial nerves, leading to drooping of one eyelid, small pupil, or lack of perspiration on one side of the face. Together, these symptoms are called Horner syndrome and it can also cause shoulder pain.

• tumors can press on the large vein that transports blood between the head, arms, and heart. This can cause swelling of the face, neck, upper chest, and arms.

Lung cancer sometimes creates a substance similar to hormones, causing a wide variety of symptoms called paraneoplastic syndrome, which include:

- muscle weakness
- nausea or vomiting
- fluid retention
- high blood pressure
- high blood sugar,
- confusion
- seizures
- coma



What causes lung cancer?

Anyone can get lung cancer, but <u>90 percent</u> of lung cancer cases are the result of smoking.

From the moment you inhale smoke into your lungs, it starts damaging your lung tissue. The lungs can repair the damage, but continued exposure to smoke makes it increasingly difficult for the lungs to keep up the repair. Once cells are damaged, they begin to behave abnormally, increasing the likelihood of developing lung cancer. Small-cell lung cancer is almost always associated with heavy smoking. When you stop smoking, you lower your risk of lung cancer over time. Breathing in secondhand smoke is also a major risk factor. Every year in the United States, about 7,300 people who've never smoked die from lung cancer caused by secondhand smoke.

Exposure to radon, a naturally existing radioactive gas, is the second leading cause, according to the American Lung Association. Radon enters buildings through small cracks in the foundation. Smokers who are also exposed to radon have a very high risk of lung cancer.

Other risk factors include; family history of lung cancer, personal history of lung cancer, and previous radiation therapy to the chest

Breathing in other hazardous substances, especially over a long period of time, can also cause lung cancer. Mesothelioma is almost always caused by exposure to asbestos.

Other substances that can cause lung cancer are:

Arsenic, cadmium, chromium, nickel, some petroleum products, uranium

Inherited genetic mutations may make you more likely to develop lung cancer, especially if you smoke or are exposed to other carcinogens. Sometimes, there's no obvious cause for lung cancer.

Cancer stages tell how far the cancer has spread and help guide treatment. The chance of successful or curative treatment is much higher when lung cancer is diagnosed and treated in the early stages, before it spreads. Because lung cancer doesn't cause obvious symptoms in the earlier stages, diagnosis often comes after it has spread.

Non-small cell lung cancer has four main stages:

- Stage 1: Cancer is found in the lung, but it has not spread outside the lung.
- Stage 2: Cancer is found in the lung and nearby lymph nodes.
- Stage 3: Cancer is in the lung and lymph nodes in the middle of the chest.
- **Stage 3A:** Cancer is found in lymph nodes, but only on the same side of the chest where cancer first started growing.
- **Stage 3B:** Cancer has spread to lymph nodes on the opposite side of the chest or to lymph nodes above the collarbone.
- Stage 4: Cancer has spread to both lungs, into the area around the lungs, or to distant organs.

<u>Small-cell lung cancer (SCLC) has two main stages.</u> In the limited stage, cancer is found in only one lung or nearby lymph nodes on the same side of the chest.

The extensive stage means cancer has spread:

- throughout one lung, to the opposite lung, to lymph nodes on the opposite side
- to fluid around the lung, to bone marrow, to distant organs

At the time of diagnosis, 2 out of 3 people with SCLC are already in the extensive stage.

Treatment for lung cancer

It's usually a good idea to seek a second opinion before beginning treatment. Your doctor may be able to help make that happen. If you're diagnosed with lung cancer, your care will likely be managed by a team of doctors who may include a surgeon who specializes in the chest and lungs (thoracic surgeon), a lung specialist (pulmonologist), a medical oncologist, a radiation oncologist

Discuss all your treatment options before making a decision. Your doctors will coordinate care and keep each other informed.

Treatment for non-small cell lung cancer (NSCLC) varies from person to person. Much depends on specific details of your health:

<u>Stage 1 NSCLC</u>: Surgery to remove a portion of the lung may be all you need. Chemotherapy may also be recommended, especially if you're at high risk of recurrence.

<u>Stage 2 NSCLC</u>: You may need surgery to remove part or all of your lung. Chemotherapy is usually recommended.

Stage 3 NSCLC: You may require a combination of chemotherapy, surgery, and radiation treatment.

<u>Stage 4 NSCLC</u> is particularly hard to cure. Options include surgery, radiation, chemotherapy, targeted therapy, and immunotherapy.

Options for small cell-lung cancer (NSCLC) also include surgery, chemotherapy, and radiation therapy. In most cases, the cancer will be too advanced for surgery. However, clinical trials provide access to promising new treatments. Ask your doctor if you're eligible for a clinical trial.

Some people with advanced lung cancer choose not to continue with treatment. You can still choose palliative care treatments, which are focused on treating the symptoms of cancer rather than the cancer itself.

Symptom Relief

Home remedies and homeopathic remedies won't cure cancer. But certain home remedies may help relieve some of the symptoms associated with lung cancer and side effects of treatment.

Ask your doctor if you should take dietary supplements and if so, which ones. Some herbs, plant extracts, and other natural remedies can interfere with treatment and endanger your health. Be sure to discuss all complementary therapies with your doctor to make sure they're safe for you. Other options may include:

Massage - With a qualified therapist, massage can help relieve pain and anxiety. Some massage therapists are trained to work with people with cancer.

Acupuncture - When performed by a trained practitioner, acupuncture may help ease pain, nausea, and vomiting. But it's not safe if you have low blood counts or take blood thinners.

Meditation - Relaxation and reflection can reduce stress and improve overall quality of life in cancer patients.

Hypnosis - Helps you relax and may help with nausea, pain, and anxiety.

Yoga - Combining breathing techniques, meditation, and stretching, yoga can help you feel better overall and improve sleep.

Diet

There's no diet specifically for lung cancer. It is important to get all the nutrients your body needs. If you're deficient in certain vitamins or minerals, your doctor can advise you which foods can provide them. Otherwise, you'll need a dietary supplement. Don't take supplements without talking to your doctor because some can interfere with treatment. Here are a few more dietary tips:

- Eat whenever you have an appetite.
- If you don't have a major appetite, try eating smaller meals throughout the day.
- If you need to gain weight, supplement with low sugar, high-calorie foods and drinks.
- Use mint and ginger teas to soothe your digestive system.
- If your stomach is easily upset or you have mouth sores, avoid spices and stick to bland food.
- If constipation is a problem, add more high-fiber foods.

As you progress through treatment, your tolerance to certain foods may change. So can your side effects and nutritional needs. It's worth discussing nutrition with your doctor often. You can also ask for a referral to a nutritionist or dietician. A well-balanced diet can help you fight side effects and feel better.
