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Greetings,

Recently I was doing some filing in my office when I ran across a newsletter article that I shared at my very first full time appointment out of seminary at the Drayton/Glasston parish in northern North Dakota. As I read the words of Dietrich Bonhoeffer (a Lutheran theologian who was executed in a Nazi concentration camp just prior to the end of World War II) and the comments I shared surrounding them, I realized that the message still rings true today and I have decided to share them with you. The following article was originally written September 25th, 2000. I hope the words speak to your hearts and minds.



Cheap grace is the deadly enemy of the church. We are fighting today for costly grace. Cheap grace means grace sold on the market like cheapjack swears. The sacraments, the forgiveness of sin, and the consolations of religion are thrown away at cut prices... Cheap grace means grace is a doctrine, a principle, a system... An intellectual assent to that idea is held to be of itself sufficient to secure remission of sins... In such a church the world finds a cheap covering for its sins; no contrition is required, still less any real desire to be delivered from sin. Cheap grace therefore amounts to denial of the living Word of God, in fact, a denial of the Incarnation of the Word of God. Cheap grace means the justification of sin without the justification of the sinner... Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, communion without confession, absolution without personal confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and Incarnate.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, *The Cost of Discipleship*

Though these words were written in a different generation and place, (1937, Germany) the words, unfortunately, ring true in our society today. It seems as though we are living in a society where anything goes. Sadly, the church, has in many cases also bought into such a mentality as well.

It seems to me that we, in the American church, have come to a point where we are focusing entirely on grace. Ordinarily this would be a thing of great joy, however the grace that we have been focusing on has been cheap grace and, as Bonhoeffer said, cheap grace is the deadly enemy of the church.

In our efforts to appear non-judgmental, the church has allowed the message of Jesus Christ to become distorted. Rather than sharing the message that life in Christ is radical, life changing, and more fulfilling, the church and its members have decided that the message of Christ need not necessarily change lives. Instead, the church seems to have taken the stance that anything goes. We, after all, are in no position to judge. What we fail to realize is that there is a difference between judging people and encouraging them to fulfill the potential that is theirs in Christ.

While I agree that we are all sinners and have fallen short of the glory of God, I do not believe that that fact disqualifies us from encouraging and (at times) rebuking one another if we see evidence that our brothers and sisters in the faith are falling short of the mark. However, that is not the view we have taken in the church.

Costly grace is the gospel that must be sought again and again, instead we have bought into the world's ideas that anything goes or that we are in no place to judge others. All the while we fail to realize the difference between judging and caring. And while we're at it we sell cheap grace to all who want to hear it.

While "cheap grace is the deadly enemy of the church," costly grace is, on the other hand, the real grace of Jesus Christ. The gift which must be asked for, the door at which a person must knock.


Such grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a man his life, and it is grace because it gives a person the only true life. It is costly because it condemns sin, and grace because it justifies the sinner. Above all, it is costly because it cost God the life of his Son: 'ye were bought at a price', and what has cost God much cannot be cheap for us. Above all it is grace because God did not reckon his Son too dear a price to pay for our life, but delivered him up for us. Costly grace is the Incarnation of God.

The price we are having to pay today in the shape of the collapse of the organized church is only the inevitable consequences of our policy of making grace available to all at too low a cost we gave away the word and sacraments wholesale. We poured forth unending streams of grace. But the call to follow Jesus in the narrow way was hardly ever heard.

Until next time, may the *costly* grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

As you know the COVID pandemic has been a struggle for individuals, organizations and businesses and Centenary United Methodist Church is no exception to this. It has been a rough year all around. And like in any small church, the finances are always an issue and that has been the case at Centenary for some time now. But it has been exacerbated by the COVID pandemic.



So, our Accountable Leadership Board began some discussions a few months ago about where we were sitting financially and where we are heading with the fact that we are living in a COVID world. The worship numbers have not rebounded since we returned to in person worship and there were some concerns raised that with the trajectory we are on, we as a congregation would not be able to support a full-time Pastor in the future.

Our board chair contacted our District Superintendent and shared some of those concerns with him about being able to afford a full-time pastor going forward. As it turns out the conference had an immediate need at Hazel Green UMC, where they had suddenly lost their pastor. The Wisconsin Conference had that church without a pastor and our church stating that they do not know if we will be able to afford a full-time pastor.

Through some meetings with both Centenary's board and Hazel Green's board the decision has been made to enter into a Ministry Partnership where the expenses of the Pastor, will be shared between the two congregations. Now there are some practical practices that we had to discuss. One being that both churches worship at the same time (9:30 on Sunday morning). Obviously, the technology doesn't exist for me to be in two places at the exact time and the orders of Worship are a bit different so even if that was possible, it still wouldn't work .

Members of both boards met together on Monday, October 25 and made some decisions regarding worship times. Other decisions will have to be made as we live into this experience. **But, beginning November 7, I will be serving both congregations. So, what that means for our in-person worship, is that worship time is changing from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.** Likely the time of online worship will also change to that time so that it is still streaming at the same time as the live service. But since it is pre-recorded, we could possibly change that if those who faithfully watch the online worship desire. I just wanted to let you know that that change is coming.

Shullsburg has had to shift their worship to accommodate this change, Hazel Green has shifted their worship time as well to help accomplish this. Their worship service will now be at 8:45 a.m. So we are hoping that this partnership will enable us to maintain a full-time clergy person at Centenary and Hazel Green. That we may both experience the grace and love of our Lord Jesus Christ. That we may be the witnesses to our communities that God calls us to be and that through that witness, both churches will grow. That is our hope and prayer. I would sincerely ask that you join us in those prayers. If you have any questions, please let me or one of the ALB members know.

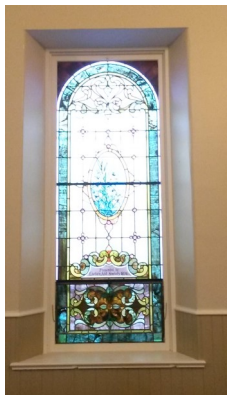

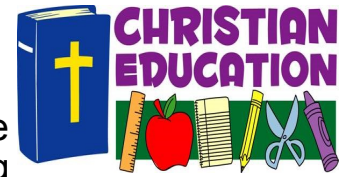

From Our Parish Nurse.....

November is Hospice and Palliative Care Month

Many people are familiar with Hospice care, but do you know what Palliative care is and what it can do for you or a loved one living with a serious illness?

What Is Palliative Care?

Palliative care is specialized medical care for people living with a chronic or serious illness. This type of care is focused on providing relief from the symptoms and stress of the illness. The goal is to improve quality of life for both the patient and the family. Palliative care is provided by a specially-trained team of doctors, nurses and other specialists who work together with a patient's other doctors to provide an extra layer of support. Palliative care is based on the needs of the patient, not on the patient's prognosis. It is appropriate at any age and at any stage in a serious illness, and it can be provided along with curative treatment.

Palliative care improves Quality of Life.

Palliative care teams focus on quality of life. They treat people suffering from the symptoms and stress of serious illnesses such as cancer, congestive heart failure (CHF), chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), kidney disease, Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) and many more.



Palliative care relieves Suffering From Symptoms and Stress.

The goal of palliative care is to relieve suffering and provide the best possible quality of life for patients and their families. Chronic and serious illness bring symptoms that may include pain, depression, shortness of breath, fatigue, constipation, nausea, loss of appetite, difficulty sleeping, and anxiety. The team will help you gain the strength to carry on with daily life. In short, palliative care will help improve your quality of life. And recent studies, including one published in the New England Journal of Medicine, have shown that patients with a serious illness who received palliative care lived longer than those who did not receive this care.

Palliative care Helps You Match Treatment Options to Your Goals.

The palliative care team also spends the time it takes to help you match your treatment choices to your goals. They will also make sure that all of your doctors know and understand what you want. This gives you more control over your care and will improve your quality of life.

Palliative care Works Together with Your Other Doctors.

Palliative care teams are specialists who work together with you, your family and your other doctors. They provide an extra layer of support when you need it most. In addition to treating your symptoms and stress and supporting you and your family, the palliative care team communicates with all of your doctors so that everyone is on the same page. They support you every step of the way.

If you or a loved one is facing a serious illness, you may benefit from palliative care. You can have palliative care at any point in your illness. Speak to your doctor, and ask about how palliative care can work for you!
