




As November approaches, we find ourselves on the brink of the Thanksgiving season, a time of gratitude, unity and reflection. It is with warmth in my heart that I greet each and every one of you during this special time of the year.



Thanksgiving is a time when we come together with our loved ones to appreciate the blessings in our lives, both big and small. It's season that reminds us of the importance of family, friends, and the bonds we share as a church community.

A short while back, during one of our Sunday sermons, I introduced you to a significant concept known as 'Normativity.' Therefore, we are to turn to the Holy Spirit, one common denominator among all the people of diverse backgrounds. Ephesians 4: 3-4 says...make every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling,

As we gather with our families and friends, let us embrace one another with open hearts, understanding, and compassion, recognizing that our differences are what make our relationships richer and more meaningful. May your Thanksgiving be a time of warmth, unity and the purest expressions of God's love. I am truly thankful for each one of you and the faith that binds us together.

# All Saints' Sunday


On Sunday, November 5 during our worship, we will light a candle and read the names of our loved ones who have passed into eternal life in the past year.

### Infant Baptism

Adult baptisms are typically part of becoming a member of the church. At Centenary UMC, we also celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism for infants and children. 

### God's Abundance

I started preaching when I was just 18 years old. I was invited by my home pastor to preach, despite my age, because he knew I had a call to the ordained ministry. By the time I was 20, I had preached a whopping three sermons. With my call and this vast amount of experience behind me, I was invited to serve a small, rural congregation in Southeastern Wisconsin as their supply pastor — which basically meant I would visit the members in their homes and preach every Sunday. And so, in November of my junior year of college, I began to preach every Sunday for a congregation of 52 people. As I remember my first year there, I have fond memories of a group of faithful people who had to listen to, probably the worst sermons ever given.

Despite my inexperience, the congregation was very supportive — often offering a tip or an encouraging word. Particularly, I remember one gentleman who came up to me to give me a pat on the back one Sunday morning. After a particularly difficult sermon he said that he truly enjoyed my messages. A little surprised, I responded by simply saying, "Really?" He continued by saying, "Oh yes. You know, you stand up every Sunday and try to tell us about God's love and grace. But what I really like is the fact that, in the whole year you've been preaching, you've never mentioned money once."

Considering that comment, I suppose it could be seen as a bit ironic that my ministry as a part of the Foundation is helping congregations and pastors learn how to comfortably talk about money in relation to our faith (maybe even excitedly). What I've discovered, however, is that talking about stewardship is about focusing love and grace. It is about helping people realize all the ways we are blessed by God, that God has given to us abundantly. God has given us so much, in fact, that we have enough to give generously in love for others.

I encourage you to speak about stewardship boldly. Talk about how you have experienced God's love, grace, and abundance. Share how generosity has transformed your life. Talk about the blessings others have experienced in your church that are made possible by your community's generosity.

## From Our Parish Nurse.....

### November is Hospice and Palliative Care Month

Many people are familiar with Hospice care, but do you know what Palliative care is and what it can do for you or a loved one living with a serious illness?

### What Is Palliative Care?

Palliative care is specialized medical care for people living with a chronic or serious illness. This type of care is focused on providing relief from the symptoms and stress of the illness. The goal is to improve quality of life for both the patient and the family. Palliative care is provided by a specially-trained team of doctors, nurses and other specialists who work together with a patient's other doctors to provide an extra layer of support. Palliative care is based on the needs of the patient, not on the patient's prognosis. It is appropriate at any age and at any stage in a serious illness, and it can be provided along with curative treatment.

### Palliative care improves Quality of Life.

Palliative care teams focus on quality of life. They treat people suffering from the symptoms and stress of serious illnesses such as cancer, congestive heart failure (CHF), chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), kidney disease, Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) and many more.



### Palliative care relieves Suffering From Symptoms and Stress.

The goal of palliative care is to relieve suffering and provide the best possible quality of life for patients and their families. Chronic and serious illness bring symptoms that may include pain, depression, shortness of breath, fatigue, constipation, nausea, loss of appetite, difficulty sleeping, and anxiety. The team will help you gain the strength to carry on with daily life. In short, palliative care will help improve your quality of life. And recent studies, including one published in the New England Journal of Medicine, have shown that patients with a serious illness who received palliative care lived longer than those who did not receive this care.

### Palliative care Helps You Match Treatment Options to Your Goals.

The palliative care team also spends the time it takes to help you match your treatment choices to your goals. They will also make sure that all of your doctors know and understand what you want. This gives you more control over your care and will improve your quality of life.

### Palliative care Works Together with Your Other Doctors.

Palliative care teams are specialists who work together with you, your family and your other doctors. They provide an extra layer of support when you need it most. In addition to treating your symptoms and stress and supporting you and your family, the palliative care team communicates with all of your doctors so that everyone is on the same page. They support you every step of the way.

If you or a loved one is facing a serious illness, you may benefit from palliative care. You can have palliative care at any point in your illness. Speak to your doctor, and

ask about how palliative care can work for you!


